Historic Information: Very little is known by the owner and neighbors about the history of this barn. Oral tradition from a neighbor has it as built around 1858, but that is unlikely. The Buckner

family was a large family settled throughout the east end of Madison County. The community along Middle Fork Creek was called Buckner and included a post office.
