Add. Info.: As an early burley tobacco barn, it has no apparent venting along the exterior walls, as was common later. The monitor roof appears to have been thought to cover the venting needs. Burley tobacco was relatively early in its history and this was one of the earliest barns built exclusively for burley air-curing, and venting would likely not have been well-understood or needed. Blue mold disease likely became a problem, requiring more venting in later year.

ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS characteristics

Has the original barn been altered or added to? Appears to have had a shed addition on the east side at some time.

Outbuildings: a drive-thru corn crib is on the site, neglected and dilapidated.

Setting and/or Surrounding Land Use: The farm is part of an original landholding of 200 acres of rolling land within the valley of Gabriel's Creek.

Historic Information: This farm is thought to be part of an early speculative development on Gabriel's Creek, owned by Gabriel Keith and John Allen in 1830s, who came from Philadelphia via Roanoke VA as land speculators. An original log house is on the property thought to have been built in 1856. Descendants include Lawrence Allen and James Keith, primary Confederate officers in the infamous Shelton Laurel Massacre of the Civil War in 1863. Curtis Buckner married Sallie Allen, daughter of Tommy Allen, and acquired the land through that marriage.
